

DIXIE HIGHWAY HERITAGE

The Dixie Highway Association was organized in Chattanooga, Tennessee in April 1915, in an era before federal and state regulation and funding for road building projects. The association was responsible for routing decisions, set standards for road bed construction and signage and marketed the Dixie Highway extensively through its own magazine and the distribution of maps and other promotional materials. Membership was open to anyone and annual dues were \$5.00, which entitled members to a subscription to the association's monthly magazine, *The Dixie Highway*, a brass radiator badge and a membership card and certificate.

Dear Sire

If the present bill now before congress calling on the war department to select, improve, and maintain certain main highways through-out the Nation on account of their military importance, goes through, some communities will benefit very materially. The Dixie Highway has somewhat of an advantage over routings which are not as familiarly known. However, to make the right sort of impression and back up the work the Association is doing for you, it is going to be necessary that you concentrate your efforts on the improvement of the Dixie Highway through your community, and that you see to it at once that your road is thoroughly marked with either the official copyrighted metal or painted markers as described in circulars enclosed herewith.

The bill referred to, has been prepared by the Military Affaire Committee of the Senate and has the enformement of the American Automobile Association. -here is little doubt as to it's ultimate paseage in some form.

Should your section of the highway not be selected as a part of the military highway system of the fation, you will profit at least from the tourist travel which the marking of the road will help the Association bring to you. The Diric Highway Association in replying to inquiries direct and through the touring bureaus and Auto clubs, are constantly in touch with these tourists. The Association is likewise constantly increasing the advertising value of the name "Diric Highway" through its publicity department. You have only to take advantage of this by marking your road thoroughly now, in time for the summer tourist travel by marking your road thoroughly now, in time for the summer tourist travel In so doing you will be increasing your chances to profit in the estab-lishment of a system of military highways. The association also encouraged individuals, businesses and local governments to fund the highway's construction and improvements. By the mid-1920's, maintenance of the Dixie Highway was taken over by state and county governments and some sections became a part of the U.S. highway system. The Dixie Highway Association was disbanded in 1927.


catalogues. Popular city styles were now available to rural areas of the country.

This former shop rig was converted to a chemical rig at the Shops in 1937. The chemical equipment carried on this rig wasted as a "foamite" and "DuGas System". The foamite equipment consisted of a foamite generator, hopper, and twenty to twenty-fix and of foam powder. The foam powder was dumped into the generator which was connected to a regular 2½ inch hose line. The foam owder, mixed with and propelled by the water, formed a thick foam blanket which smothered fires. The "DuGas System" consisted or powder chemical contained in vertical tanks propelled by nitrogen through 500 feet of one inch hose to the fire. After retirement is rig was used by the CFD Clowns for entertainment purposes, and is currently in storage at the Repair Shops.

This rig was delivered to the CFD August 2, 1930 and served the repair shops until 1937 when it was converted to a chemical unit. It was in service as a chemical unit until January 1959, when it was retired from active service. The Chicago Fire Museum would like to know if we would be interested in restoring this unit. It seems to be all there and if your interested as a club we can go take a look at the unit for a better assessment. Phil
