As the heat of summer has hit us driving your model A may be a little uncomfortable. I recommend that you check the air conditioner before driving any distance. Insure that all controls are fully functioning so you can fully very the amount of air supplied to the interior compartment. The lock down controls always need adjustment attention. Insure that the variable reflow controls work in the second seat area to insure complete driving and passenger comfort. Also a full ice charge in the 6 or 8 cell

The Curtis Brick Company was established in Grant Park in 1881. At the height of its operation, over 25 rail carloads of brick were shipped a day to Chicago.

The brickyard supplied over 30,000,000 bricks to Sears, Roebuck and Company for their warehouse and office facilities completed in 1906 on Chicago's west side.

The brickyard facilities were severely damaged by a tornado that struck Grant Park on April 21, 1912. The brickyard rebuilt, but suffered severe damage by fire in 1916.

It was never rebuilt after this and ceased operations. Today the old yard is the site of Lake Metonga and a residential subdivision on the Grant Park's east side, one of the many destinations along the annual *Drivin' the Dixie*.

She ran back to Irv, "It's a miracle...I've got a replacement chair for Sandi and Al already." That made Irv feel sooo much better.

Irv also won third place in the Poker Run, which REALLY made his day.

All in all, it was a fantastic day, can't wait to drive the 2012 Dixie. We thought the "Driving the Dixie 2011" was a well planned and successful event, even though....you had to stand on your head to read the tour guide map to navigate correctly.

IT WAS SUCH AN EXPERIENCE!

This story has nothing to do with cars in general. This story, however, has everything to do with the Model A Ford and a family.

It's hard to know where to begin so I'll begin with the ending, which was last night, June 29, 2011. About half of the members of the A's R Us Model A Club met to welcome home our most senior member from the Honor Flight Chicago at Midway Airport. Midway Airport was so named to honor the World War II Battle of Midway. We really didn't know what to expect but knew we wanted to surprise Herman Senkpiel along with his children, grandchildren, and great-grand children. Herman and his late wife, Ruth, have been members of our club for at least ten years. I don't know exactly how many Model A's he's had over the years, probably more than the two I know of. His son Randy and wife Bonnie are also members of A's R Us.

Honor Flight Chicago is an event that takes World War II veterans to Washington, DC for a day trip. It's a very long day trip. They see the monument devoted to honoring their service and sacrifice in the ugly and horrific battles they experienced. They also saw other DC monuments and historic sites of interest. On the return trip the vets have a mail call not unlike what they had in the remote areas of the world during their time in service. Friends and family were able to write letters prior to the flight and sent them to the Honor Flight Chicago address. Herman's son Randy told me he thought about fifty letters were sent on Herman's behalf. That's some kind of Mail Call.

Sixteen A's R Us members walked into the lower level of Midway Airport and were collectively blown back by the sheer numbers of people already waving flags and cheering. We were told that each of the 97 World War II veterans on the flight would individually be escorted by a member of the military as they came down the roped off aisle. There were color guards, honor guards, Viet Nam vets carrying flags, the motorcycle honor groups that greet current military returning home, bands, bagpipers, escorts and an energy in the airport that was beyond description. I have been to Chicago Bear's games and Chicago Bull's games and the energy was equal. None of the vets expected such a welcome I'm sure. The ability to shake a



veteran's hand and say "thank you" after all these years surfaced more emotion than either the vets or the rest of us anticipated. As they maneuvered the gauntlet you could hear, "welcome home". "thank you for your service", "yeah, grandpa" and on an on as the 97 veterans passed us. Some walking, most in wheel chairs, and one in his old uniform. How amazing he looked.

I saw three of the 97 vets who were women who had also served our country during World War II. I wondered as I saw them wheeled by what their experiences had been. Had they been in the Pacific, Asia or Europe? Were they medical people? What had they seen? Were they pilots delivering planes to needed areas as they came off the assembly lines? So many thoughts! Mostly I remembered my uncles and one family friend who was a WAC and wished they had lived long enough to experience this day.

What I really want to share in this story is that because of a little old Model A Ford approximately 35 people joined together as a club and became a family. As in all families, everyone was not able to attend the event, but A's R Us is still a family who all coincidentally drive the same model car. A Model A Ford. Some are Tudors, some are Roadsters, some are a Victoria, some are trucks, a Phaeton, but all are Model A Fords. The veterans, most of whom are now in their eighties, are as stalwart as the cars we love, drive and respect.

RESPECT is the word. That is why we were there to greet Herman and his fellow vets' home. If you want or need to have your American pride rekindled, go to Midway Airport or any of the other airports that support Honor Flights for World War II veterans. Shouts of USA, USA and all the flags and energy will remind you of whom we were as a country and still are.

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


