Eta Fasions

The end of WW1 brought radical changes in women's fashions. 1928/1929 saw the "College Man" and "The Flapper" as the new icons of all that was young and fashionable.

Women molded their bodies to be slimmer with flatter teenage shapes and

waistlines dipped to the hip. Hemlines got shorter and peaked just below the knee. the head hugging cloche hat was popular, rayon stockings became commonly available, short hair styles and long fingernails with colored enamel were the rage. A \$7.95 dress in 1928 would be equivalent to a \$97.00 dress in 2007. 1929 brought the Great Stock Market Crash. hemlines dropped to mid calf. fabrics changed and the 1930's

Meanwhile in the automotive industry, the Model A Ford evolved (1928-1931). The College Man & Flapper couldn't wait to spend their money on this jaunty looking auto. The Model T had been know as the "Tin Lizzie", the Model A "The Baby Lincoln". Show rooms were packed with people wanting to buy this fresh new look, that was low priced and easy to drive. The Model A hit the market in December of 1927 and Ford managed to produce and sell 5,000,000 before the Stock Market Crash. This brief moment in

automotive history 1928-1931 generated the largest gathering of enthusiasm around a single model vehicle and has made The Model A Ford the easiest vintage car to buy, understand & maintain. Henry had definitely made a Lady out of Lizzie.






