

Accidents, thievery, murder and other mayhem are some of the tales that comprise the story of the Dixie Highway in Illinois. This month the story is of fire that destroyed an early Dixie landmark as told by the March 11, 1938 edition of the *Beecher Herald*.

"Fire of mysterious origin completely destroyed the Reising garage and motor agency early Monday morning, razing the large one story building and ruining nineteen automobiles, including three new machines. Estimates of the loss ran as high as \$20,000.

Although the walls of the building were of cement block construction, the heat of the flames was so intense that the entire structure was in ruins within an hour after the first alarm sounded...Breaking out at 1:30 a.m. near the front of the structure, the flames spread rapidly to every section of the garage. By the time the Beecher volunteer fire department arrived, the building was smoke filled and the roof was about to burst into flames.



A series of explosions quickly ended all hope of saving either the building or contents. Flames spread to tires on a rack above the display window, and then traveled toward the stored autos in the rear. Gasoline tanks of the cars exploded in rapid fire succession, as did oil and gasoline stored in cans. The blaze reached its height about twenty minutes after the alarm was sounded...So complete was the destruction that the owners said no attempt would be made to repair it.

The garage building was situated on the west side of the Dixie Highway near the north limits of the village. It was constructed only a few years ago {1936}. In addition to operating a large repair business, the Reising brothers were agents in the community for Chevrolet and Oldsmobile cars."

The Reisings would rebuild and sold new Chevrolets through 2010 when General Motors did not renew their franchise agreement in a corporate consolidation that affected over 1000 other new car dealers.

Hours after Pearl Harbor was bombed



on December 7, 1941, the Secret Service found themselves in a bind. President Franklin D. Roosevelt was to give his Day of Infamy speech to Congress on Tuesday, and although the trip from the White House to Capitol Hill was short, agents weren't sure how to transport him safely. At the time, Federal Law prohibited buying any cars that cost more than \$750, so they would have to get clearance from Congress to do that, and nobody had time for that. One of the Secret Service members, however, discovered that the US Treasury had seized the bulletproof car that mobster Al Capone owned when he was sent to jail in 1931. They cleaned it, made sure it was running perfectly and had it ready for the President the next day.

Mechanics are said to have cleaned and checked each feature of the Caddy well into the night of December 7th, to make sure that it would run properly the next day for the Commander in Chief. And run properly it did. It had been painted black and green to look identical to Chicago's police cars at the time. To top it off, the gangster's 1928 Cadillac Town Sedan had 3,000 pounds of armor and inch-thick bulletproof windows. It also had a specially installed siren and flashing lights hidden behind the grille, along with a police scanner radio.

Footnote: The car was sold at auction in 2012 for \$341,000.









Illinois Club Prepares for Road Medical Emergency

The A's R Us Chicago Southland club had a very different meeting in January to say the least. While differ-

ent, the meeting will probably be one of the most important our members have ever attended.

Like most clubs, ours has a tendency to "get away from it all" and travel far from civilization on our road trips. With most members on the downside of the half-century mark, this can create a problem particularly if medical treatment is ever needed. For years, we simply ignored the problem until a few minor issues forced us to think more seriously about what we would do if one of our members had a candiac event or some other serious medical incident in the "middle of nowhere." In most cases, trained medical help could be more than 10 to 20 minutes away, which could be too long a period of time to be of any benefit in a real emergency.

As a certified Firefighter EMT-B in the state of Illinois. I have thought about this for some time and decided to do something. While we do have a retired paramedic and a couple of nurses in our club, we had no equipment for them to provide adequate care, and I wanted to be prepared. Who knows, I could be the one in need rather than the one to provide the help! Through contacts in the medical field, I was able to come up with an economically priced AED (Automatic External Defibrillator). In November, I presented this proposition to our club, and the motion to purchase this piece of equipment passed unanimously.

Our January meeting was held at my house, and it was a time to teach our members the skills to use the AED. Vince Penna from "Defib Solutions" in Crown Point, Indiana, gave us the great deal on our AED and also offered his time and expertise to teach our club how to use the AED and how to perform CPR. effectively in the event we over had to use this equipment.

The meeting night started % hour earlier than normal, and we got directly into our program with Vince traching American Heart Association CPR and AED usage. He was quite a good teacher using stories and funny anecdotes to keep everyone involved and focused on the new skill sets be was teaching. In no time, he had our members performing CPR to the tune of "Staying Alive" on "Preston" mannequins. These are state-of-the-art and have LED lights built in that let you know you are keeping to the recommended 100 beats per minute. After this workout that had its burnorous moments, he introduced us to our new Cardiac Science G3 AED. Vince explained placement of pads and how to follow the prorapts that the unit will give us in an emergency.







We learned a lot that evening, and most importantly, we learned the quicker you defibrillate a victim the greater the chances of survival. A victim's chances of survival are reduced by 7 to 10 percent with every minute that passes without CPR and defibrillation. Few attempts at resuscitation succeed after 10 minutes. We have bettered our odds with our purchase, and you may want to better yours too.

For years, I have kept a small tackle box with some basic first aid supplies. Now, I have put together a Basic Life Support bag with airways, ambo bag, prep kit and our Cardiac Science G3 AED. We also will carry a glucose meter, blood pressure cuff, stethoscope, baby aspirin, Benadryl, antibiotic cream, sterile water, basic dressings and the all-important Band-Aid.

In short, the AED is an insurance policy that I hope we never have to use, but if we need to, our club members will have the confidence to render quality aid when and wherever we may travel.

Cruisin' for Camp Quality


