DIXIE HIGHWAY HERITAGE

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
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Indian Motocycle

Unfortunately the Dixie Highway figured prominently in the death of Homewood's first and only police officer killed in the line of duty. On October 18, 1920, Homewood motorcycle officer Paul Edward Buckley joined state patrolman Earl Kessner chasing a car on the Dixie Highway. Kessner had observed the car break through a road construction barrier and initiated the chase. Buckley joined the chase in Homewood and the two motor officers proceeded south on the Dixie Highway in hot pursuit of the traffic violator. As the chase neared "Al Sabbath's corner" (south of Holbrook Road), a delivery truck belonging to the Mandel Brothers Store of Chicago pulled across the highway. Overgrowth of trees and brush along the roadside obscured the motorcyclists' vision of the obstruction until it was too late. Buckley was unable to stop or swerve to avoid the truck and hit it broadside. Kessner, who was behind Buckley, swerved into a ditch and avoided any injury. The offender's vehicle escaped unscathed.



James Hospital by a passing automobile and was initially thought not to be severely injured. He was conscious after the accident and appeared to be slightly bruised about the head. Looks were deceiving. Buckley suffered internal injuries and died the next morning.

To compound the tragedy, village employees were not insured at the time. Donations were collected for Buckley's burial expenses and to help his widow and three young children. After his burial was paid for, excess funds in the amount of \$265.10 were given to Mrs. Buckley! As is the case so many times, the village board passed a motion after the accident to provide accident and liability insurance coverage on the village's police officers and workmen, to late to be of any help to the Buckley family.





FASHION: Ahh the roaring twenties

There hasn't been a decade since the Roaring Twenties that has loved sparkle and bling as much. Bead and fringe layered dresses; feathered hair clips, headbands and skull caps dressed up short hairdo's.

There was not just one style of headband or one way to wear it. Day wear consisted of a ribbon or scarf that was rolled and tied around the head. For evening wear it would be made of continuous strands of pearls, rhinestones or beads wrapped around the top of the head to the back of the skull or a rolled scarf with a big fluffy bow tied on the side, peacock feathers and sprays of gold or silver. Day head wear was small and dainty where as evening head wear became bold and garish. This trend started in 1924 when King Tut's Tomb was discovered; soon after every woman wanted to look like an Egyptian Queen.





The favorite daytime headwear was the Cloche Hat. It was the invention of French milliner Caroline Reboux, who introduced it in Paris in 1923. It was made of velvet, satin, horsehair, straw or felt. The word Cloche meaning "bell" in French hid a womans hair, by allowing her to tuck it up into the hat. Some variations of the standard cloche were the Gigolo hat with its wider brim with one side dipped lower than the other and a creased top. Another variation was called a skullcap or a brimless cloche with long sides and back, totally covering bangs and spit curls. The popularity of the Cloche had spread like wildfire from the streets of Paris to the American Catalogues enabling women of all financial brackets to be a part of the FLAPPER REVOLUTION.


