

A rare 1931 Ford Model A Victoria Joe

Once upon a time, cars were not the mass-produced clones you see on the road today. Each car produced was a meticulous work of art, like a fine time-piece, to be passed on from generation to generation, father to son or mother to daughter. The listing quotes the following:

"... if we do it right, they're going to be here long after we're gone-- and as such, we're not really owners, we're simply the custodians of these beautiful automobiles."

We couldn't agree more. Rarely do these pieces of stunning craftsmanship come up for sale, and if they do, they are usually half-rusted barn finds in need of some serious facelifts. Today's remarkable find is already picture-perfect, and has quite the storied past, having survived World War II hidden from the occupying Nazi forces - a metallic survivor in more ways than one.

Today's remarkable find is this 1931 Ford Model A Victoria:

The coach work done on this car was from the renowned German coach builder Karosseriefirma Gläser of Dresden, and the car is said to be "made of Ash and Oak wrapped in steel." (We love the poetry of that sentiment!) Unlike today's car, there is not a bit of fiberglass to be found anywhere. The car is in great shape, and the listing notes that "this was the cover car for the "AACA Antique Automobile" magazine in 1965, November-December issue, and a several-page article was featured inside as well, giving wonderful insight to this unique car's history." Two copies of the magazine will be sent to the winner of the auction, as well as the car.

Some of that history is related on the listing's description, which is worth a read in its entirety. Here is an excerpt:

"Just when Germany's Reichstag elections had produced The National Socialist Party, under Adolf Hitler, as Germany's majority political power, Ford chassis #3957780, was built in Detroit-- September 1930. The chassis was shipped to Ford of Cologne, Germany, who sold it in turn to Karosseriefirma Gläser of Dresden-- arguably the finest coach builder in all of Europe. Built to perfection, this car was purchased from Gläser, and its original "custodian" was a Danish nobleman (here affectionately known as "The Baron"), who took delivery in mid-1931. A year later, in August of 1932, it was sold to S.V. Salzwendel, a Danish Army officer whose homeland was invaded and occupied by the Nazis in 1940. Although, since 1938, Hitler's National Socialist Party had confiscated some 3700 automobiles from around Europe, Salzwendel somehow managed to hide his fine Gläser during five years of German occupation in Denmark.

He owned this car for 31 years before eventually selling to Ib Jensen of Copenhagen in 1963. Jensen had been shown photos of the car, which by then was well-known in Aarhus, Denmark's second largest city. Jensen purchased the car from Salzwendel eight days later on the promise that he would never sell it back into Germany-- Salzwendel perhaps a little bitter after WWII had taken such a toll on so much of Europe where many Gläsers and other extraordinary automobiles and coaches are believed to have perished. In (estimated) early 1965, after a thorough and beautiful restoration, Jensen (today still a member of an antique automobile club in Copenhagen) kept his promise and sold this surviving Gläser to John H.



Timmis, III, of State College, Pennsylvania, USA.Much of the next 49 years is sketchy at best. The car is owned today by Heather Anderson of Tucson, Arizona. It is remembered to have been shown at the renowned Hershey Car Shows in Pennsylvania during the late 60's and early 70's; and, having undergone at least one more restoration, it resides today in a small town in Southeastern Arizona."

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
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
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VIEW OF THORNTON PLANT






Although the Thornton Quarry is not on the Dixie Highway, it has figured prominently in the history of the Dixie Highway and road building throughout northern Illinois for over a century. Quarrying has taken place in Thornton since 1838 when Gurdon Hubbard opened the first quarry in town. Earlier in his life Hubbard had gained fame as a fur trader who blazed a trail between Vincennes, Indiana and Chicago, much of which would later become the template for the Dixie Highway in Illinois. Others operated quarries and lime operations at Thornton for the remainder of the 19th century and it was not until 1886, when R.E, Brownell took over these operations, that production increased significantly.

By 1915, when the Dixie Highway was routed, the Brownell Improvement Company's Thornton facility was the largest stone crushing plant in the world, a position held for decades. Much of that crushed stone, then as now, went to pave streets and highways throughout the state. In 1938, the quarry was sold to the Material Service Corporation. Since 2006 the Lehigh Hanson Cement Company has owned the quarry. Today, the quarry continues to produce over 7 million tons of crushed rock, aggregates and other stone products found in concrete, fertilizer, asphalt coatings and a variety of other uses, This year, the quarry will be an exciting new stop on Drivin' the Dixie in June.

Men accessorized well in the 1920's. Big Al Capone was known as the third best dressed man in history for this era. He always wore a Fedora tipped down over one eye at a rakish angle and was very selective with his ties.

Hats were a must and stylish men with a good attitude and guts to pull it off could easily choose from the Fedora, Trilby, Porkpie, Classic Top Hat, Bowler or Newsboy Cap. Neckties were wide with bold geometric designs, including stripes and quadrilateral designs. Let's not forget ascots and the classic bow tie.

Shoes were a big part of style in the 1920's and Oxfords were typically worn. The classic black and white or black and tan wingtip or captoe looked very classy and were a popular choice for formal evening wear. Finishing touches for the well dressed man were Suspenders, a pocket Scarf and Fob Watch.





During the 1920's many men began to actively participate in sports, such as golf, tennis and swimming. The more affluent enjoyed yachting and pole. New styles of sportswear were designed to provide comfort and ease of movement. Sportswear also reflected the celebrity conscious society of the time. Tennis and polio stars became trend setters, wearing cotton pole shirts and short sleeved pull overs. Style conscious golfers were knickers, with colorful argyle woolen knee socks. By 1925 men were three -piece sports suits, consisting of a jacket, vest and knickers for golf games and for casual wear at resorts. This look was popularized by professional golfers like Walter Hagen and Bobby Jones. This craze evolved into a style worn by men, especially in England, until 1950.
