Natural disasters are a part of the history of the Dixie Highway in Illinois. Blizzards, floods and tornadoes have all wrecked havoc on Dixie towns over the years. Arguably, the worst disaster to strike a Dixie town in Illinois occurred on April 21, 1912. The Momence Journal headline from Friday, April 26, 1912 proclaimed, **Cyclone Ruins Grant Park, In One Minute the Terrible Twister Turns Happy Homes to Ruins. Many Have Narrow Escapes and the Property Loss is Estimated at \$200,000.** 

The paper went on to cover the story, "At 5:30 Sunday afternoon, the most terrific storm that ever visited Kankakee county, descended on the peaceful village of Grant Park, and in one breath, swept a wide swath through the residential part of the town. The real violence of the storm lasted but about 60 seconds it is said, but it seemed to be ages to those in the grasp of the cyclone."

"The violent wind lasted for several minutes and was followed by a downpour of rain and a fierce storm of hail and then all was calm and the citizens went out to view the terrible havoc wrought by the storm and to rescue those pinioned beneath the debris."



"The loss of property is great and, in many cases, falls heavily upon those who are of moderate circumstances and paying for their homes on the installment plan....The Curtis brick factory also was leveled to the earth and it is hard to say what the loss is, but V. S. Curtis and others say it will be about \$35,000-\$40,000."

When all was said and done, in addition to the brickyard, seventeen houses and twenty-one barns were destroyed, fifty houses were partially damaged and twenty-five townspeople sustained injuries. The brickyard was rebuilt, but was destroyed by fire in 1916 and never reopened. Grant Park rebuilt and prospered.

#### POPULAR VINTAGE TOY OF THE 1920'S:

Now that Christmas is over and Santa has come and gone, I thought it would be fun to look at the toys parents had to choose from in the 1920's. Most toys were made of wood and metal as plastic had not yet been invented ...

The still popular Teddy Bear was named after President Theodore Roosevelt, whose nick name was Teddy. A 10" bear was \$0.79, 12" was \$1.00 and 14" was \$1.19. Tom Tinker Toys were round smooth balls threaded on a chord, for \$0.59. Tinker Construction Kit ranged from \$.63 to \$1.75 depending on the number of sticks and spools in the kit. The ever popular Erector Set is one of few toys still around from the early 1920's. These sets ranged in price from \$.99 to \$9.98 depending on the range of things the set was able to erect.



Flossy Flirt Doll was very popular with the girls. She said the word Ma Ma,

rolled her flirty eyes and closed them when she slept. She was priced by size ranging from 14" to 23" and priced from \$1.98 to \$4.98.

Boys loved the small cast iron cars of the day which sold for \$0.39 apiece.





Bigger toys included the Columbia 3 Wheel Velocipedes more commonly known as a tricycle. It included a bicycle bell, adjustable handle bars, padded leather saddle with coil springs, tubular frame, ball bearing wheels and bicycle spokes all for \$8.98. A Two Wheel Bike \$15.98, was suitable for boys ages 6 to 12. It had small wheels and cost \$5.00 less if you didn't want the rear coaster brakes. The 20's Pedal Car starting at \$10.98 was based on the popular cars and trucks of the day. Mostly Cadillac, Lincoln cars and MAC trucks.



The Olympic Flyer Wagon was only \$4.98, Riding Horses, geared more for girls were \$2.98 and best of all was the Hand Cars for \$3.98. The children used their arms and hands for a push/pull handle and steered with their feet. This would be a great exercise toy for children today.
