The 2015 Fall Trip and the Dixie Highway Centennial

events are now ones for the history books and all went off without a hitch. not even a breakdown along the way. The fall trip coincided with special events the club planned for the 100th anniversary of the Dixie Highway, which included a ceremony held in downtown Chicago and dedications of **Dixie Highway** interpretive signs, co-sponsored by the club in Beecher, Grant Park, Milford, Hoopeston and Danville.



The weekend began with a ceremony held on Thursday October 8th at Jackson Boulevard and Michigan Avenue, adjacent to the Art Institute. The ceremony was similar to one that occurred prior to the start of an October 1915 motorcade of citizens, government and highway officials that set out from the Art Institute in Chicago on an inspection tour of existing roads that were identified to be improved to form the highway. That year, the group left Chicago the morning of Saturday, October 9th, and arrived in Danville later that evening. The caravan continued their tour on succeeding days until arriving in Miami on October 24, 1915.



This year, on Thursday, October 8th, after gathering for breakfast in Blue Island, 9 Model A's and 17 members and guests motored downtown for the initial centennial event on a brilliant October morning. The cars arrived downtown at 9:30 am and staged on Jackson Boulevard east of Michigan Avenue and aroused the curiosity of many pedestrians walking in the area. At 10:00 am, Jim Wright led off the program by providing a brief history of the Dixie Highway and the efforts of the club and Illinois communities in promoting it. Joe Szabo, a former official with the United States Department of Transportation and former mayor of Riverdale, John Fortmann, a deputy director of the Illinois Department of Transportation, and Jim Garrett, chief executive officer of the Chicago Southland Convention and Visitors Bureau also spoke.

Following this, club members helped to unveil a prototype Dixie Highway interpretive sign for Chicago. It is hoped this prototype will serve as the catalyst for installing a sign in the downtown area. Television crews were on hand from WGN and WLS and coverage appeared on their evening newscasts.







After this event, the cars and members visited the old Chicago Motor Club building, built in 1928, which is now a Hampton Inn, to view the restoration of this Art Deco landmark. A large mural depicting named highways from the era and a 1928 Model A on display, overlook the lobby of the building.

The crew then caravanned down the Dixie Highway in Chicago, following the original route - Michigan Avenue to Garfield Boulevard, west to Western Avenue, then south into Blue Island and Homewood where members viewed the Dixie signs installed in each of these towns.

On Friday, October 9th, club members met for breakfast at Raspberry's in Steger. Despite overcast skies, spirits were high for another day celebrating the Dixie. Thirteen antiques, 2 "modern iron" and a contingent of 28 set out for this day's drive down the highway.





After making a brief stop to inspect the Crete sign, Dixie sign dedications were held in Beecher and Grant Park in the morning.

Due to chilly weather, a "picnic" chicken lunch was held indoors at the Iroquois County Old Courthouse Museum in Watseka. Museum volunteers could not have been more hospitable to our group, providing accommodations that were as good as any restaurant.

On Friday afternoon, Dixie signs were dedicated in Milford and Hoopeston. Hoopeston, as usual, went all out for the dedication. Not only was their sign beautifully landscaped, Mayor Bill Crusinbery and dedication planners welcomed the A's with "goodie" bags, which included a commemorative dedication water bottle and program. The city also had chairs set out for us, and their residents who attended the ceremony.

After touring downtown Hoopeston following the dedication, Danville and our hotel was the next stop where we all enjoyed camaraderie and a pizza and salad supper in the hotel lobby.


