A brief history of Mothers Day

The earliest history of Mothers Day dates back to the ancient annual spring festival the Greeks dedicated to maternal goddesses. The Greeks used the occasion to honor Rhea, wife of Cronus and the mother of many deities of Greek mythology.

Early Christians celebrated a Mother's Day of sorts during the festival on the fourth Sunday of Lent in honor of the Virgin Mary, the Mother of Christ. In England the holiday was expanded to include all mothers. It was then called Mothering Sunday.

The more recent history of Mothers Day dates back to 1600s in England. Here a Mothering Sunday was celebrated annually on the fourth Sunday of Lent (the 40 day period leading up to Easter) to honor mothers. After a prayer service in church to honor Virgin Mary, children brought gifts and flowers to pay tribute to their own mothers.

The idea of official celebration of Mothers day in US was first suggested by Julia Ward Howe in 1872. An activist, writer and poet Julia shot to fame with her famous Civil War song, "Battle Hymn of the Republic". Julia Ward Howe suggested that June 2 be annually celebrated as Mothers Day and should be dedicated



Anna Jarvis is recognised as the Founder of Mothers Day in US. Though Anna Jarvis never married and never had kids, she is also known as the Mother of Mothers Day, an apt title for the lady who worked hard to bestow honor on all mothers.



Anna along with her supporters wrote letters to people in positions of power lobbying for the official declaration of Mothers Day holiday. The hard work paid off. By 1911, Mother's Day was celebrated in almost every state in the Union and on May 8, 1914 President Woodrow Wilson signed a Joint Resolution designating the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day.

Another local event occurred on May 6th, the opening of the Buckingham fountain in downtown Chicago.





One of the city's most popular attractions, Buckingham Memorial fountain was dedicated in 1927. A gift to the city in honor of her late brother, Clarence, Kate Buckingham also established a \$300,000 trust fund so taxpayers would not have to cover the cost of upkeep.

Buckingham envisioned a fountain of "soft moonlight" and worked with the technicians and designers on the water and lightning.

The fountain, which is one of the largest in the world, was renovated for \$2.8 million in 1994 with the help of the Buckingham Fountain Endowment Fund, which is handled by the Art Institute of Chicago.

The fountain, designed by Edward H. Bennett, represents Lake Michigan and has four sea horses--which symbolize the four states that touch the lake- Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana and Michigan. It is constructed out of Georgia pink marble.

The fountain has remained mostly intact, although two carved fish heads were stolen from the fountain. They were missing briefly before a salvage store discovered them.
